## **Hickingbotham School of Business**

Accounting	Add ACCT 4073 Accounting Information.  Course Description A study of the role of accounting information in the organization. Major topics will include analysis and design of accounting systems, data, information flows within the organization, transaction cycles, and internal controls.  Prerequisite: Intermediate Accounting 1 (ACCT 3013). Fall 2007 and then spring semesters only thereafter.	Beginning January 1, 2008 to sit for the CPA Examinations in Arkansas, applicants will have to have a course covering accounting information systems. By adding this course we will be able to continue to offer our accounting majors all of the required courses to sit for the CPA Examination in Arkansas. This course will not increase the hours in the major for graduation purposes, but will be an elective for those who are interested in meeting the education requirements to sit for the CPA Exam at the time of graduation.
Accounting and Business Administration	Delete MATH 1063 Business Calculus from the requirements for a degree from the Hickingbotham School of Business. Change the prerequisite for MGMT 2033 to read "Prerequisite: MATH 1003 or higher MATH course."	MATH 1003 College Algebra is the highest level of math needed as prerequisite to upper division quantitative business courses.

The course content for THEA 1042 Voice and Movement has been slightly revised and no longer includes the phonetic treatment of spoken text, but rather has become an in-depth look at the way the human voice and body are used in the realm of theater. This treatment of the subject matter better prepares these students for the course THEA 2003 Acting Workshop.  Because of additional curricular changes being submitted by faculty in the Theatre Department (a reduction in the number of dance hours required for both the BA Music Theatre and the BM Music Theatre), there will be a net reduction of 2 hours in the total number of hours required for the BM Music Theatre. The current faculty can meet the staffing needs.

The faculty in the department have discussed and agreed that the benefits of this course in vocal development and stage movement are a necessary foundation for upper level performance and design classes. Therefore, it is the recommendation of the Theatre Arts faculty that this course be added to the requirements for a major in Theatre Arts. This course will raise the number of required hours for the major in Theatre Arts to 36 hours from the current 34. This will also be a pre-requisite to THEA 2003 Acting Workshop.

Theatre Arts	Change THEA 4033 Dramatic Theory and Play Development from a junior/senior elective to a junior/senior requirement for the BA Theatre Arts major. Change the current requirement of 9 additional hours in Theatre Arts to 6 additional hours in Theatre Arts.	The students in theatre arts are not currently required to take a play analysis course, and the faculty has discovered a deficiency in the students' ability to analyze and understand the various structure and styles of playwrights. The Dramatic Theory and Play Development class will give students a background in theory of dramatic structure and a handson approach to playwriting. This required course will take the place of three of the nine elective hours and not raise the number of hours for the Major in Theatre Arts. It will drop the number of junior/senior electives from nine to six while keeping the total number of hours at 36, assuming THEA 1042 Voice and Movement is changed from elective to requirement status.

A portfolio of quality art works selected in consultation with the faculty must be exhibited during the student's senior year.	Giving letter-grade credit for this course will create a greater incentive for students to perform well. It will also enable instructors to make the course requirements more rigorous. While non-English majors may now choose between American Letters or Western Letters, English majors need an exposure to world literature for a full appreciation of English literature. Students would benefit by having a course which helps develop their skills in reading and analyzing literature and which builds vocabulary before beginning the survey of literature courses, especially one such as the first survey course which begins when the language itself is in its formative years. This course contains the same type of material as the other literature courses, the only difference being the period of time it covers. Therefore, it should be a 4000-level course. This course numbering puts it in the correct sequence with the other two survey courses.
French	Delete FREN 4143 Methods of Teaching French.	In the past six years, only one student has gone through the secondary teaching program for which this course is intended. For this reason, NCATE, the education accrediting organization, will require that the program be dropped. Because of the excessive teaching loads of faculty in the foreign language program, courses that are unlikely to be taught should not be listed in the catalog.

Russian	Change the prerequisites for RUSS 3053 Advanced Russian I and RUSS 3063 Advanced Russian II.  Current RUSS 2043 or equivalent or consent of instructor, 3053 in Fall, 3063 in Spring  Proposed Prerequisite for RUSS 3053: RUSS 2043 or equivalent or consent of instructor. Prerequisite for RUSS 3063: RUSS 3053 or equivalent or consent of instructor.	The sequence of courses is structured in such a way that RUSS 3053 introduces and provides practice in grammatical structures necessary for the successful completion of 3063.
Russian	Change offering of RUSS 4033 Masterpieces of Russian Literature from spring of odd- numbered years to on demand.	It would be better to offer this course when there is a demand for it than to schedule it regularly in rotation.

Russian	Change prerequisite for RUSS 4033 Masterpieces of Russian Literature.  Current Prerequisite: RUSS 2043 or equivalent of consent of instructor  Proposed Prerequisite: RUSS 3063 or equivalent of consent of instructor.	The sequence of courses is structured in such a way that RUSS 3063 introduces and provides practice in grammatical structures necessary for the successful completion of all successive courses.
Russian	Delete RUSS 4143 Methods of Teaching Russian.	Teaching methods courses are designed to complete the program of students seeking a degree in education with a specialization in a foreign language. Since there is no teaching major in Russian, there is no need for this course. No student has signed up for it during the time that Dr. Trofimova has taught at OBU. Because of the excessive teaching loads of faculty in the foreign language program, courses that are unlikely to be taught should not be listed in the catalog.
Speech	Change the course title SPCM 1003 Fundamentals of Speech to SPCM 1003 Fundamentals of Public Speaking. Also, add the Communicating Across the Curriculum – Oral (CAC-O) designation.	The title Fundamentals of Public Speaking more clearly articulates the essence of the course. The CAC-O designation is needed to meet the university requirement of having one course (required of majors) focus on oral presentations.
Speech	Change the course title SPCM 3003 Public Speaking to SPCM 3003 Advanced Public Speaking.	Advanced Public Speaking more clearly communicates the focus of the course. The course is a follow-up course for Fundamentals of Public Speaking.
Speech	Change the time offered for SPCM 2043 Small Group Communication from spring odd-numbered years to spring.	We have been teaching Small Group Communication every spring for several years. The more-frequent offering also helps Mass Communications majors since the course is cross-listed in COMM.

Speech	Change the time offered for SPCM 2053 Speaking for Special Occasions from May of even-numbered years to on demand.	Course demand has been low for the past few years. This provides more flexibility with summer scheduling.
Speech	Change the time offered for SPCM 4023 Communication and Criticism from spring to on demand.	Faculty interest and the need for maximum flexibility while the department is in transition are the justifications.
Speech	Change the time offered for SPCM 4063 Communication and Change from fall to on demand.	Faculty interest and the need for maximum flexibility while the department is in transition are the justifications.

# **School of Interdisciplinary Studies**

<b>Proposed Changes</b>	Rationale
Change the title of CORE 2113 from American Heritage to American Civilization and CORE 2213 from Western Heritage to Western Civilization.	The course coordinators (Dr. Trey Berry and Dr. Tom Auffenberg) proposed this change for two reasons. First, the current course titles are often questioned by those who review transcripts at other colleges and universities, including graduate schools. The more common course titles proposed would reduce or eliminate the need for students to contact our faculty to send course syllabi to verify the content. Secondly, the term "heritage" has acquired negative connotations from being used by some radical groups who view history through a racist ideology that is antithetical to Ouachita's mission and core values. These proposed changes have been endorsed by the faculty who most often teach the course, as well as the Interdisciplinary Studies Committee.
Eliminate the course CORE 2423 Investigative Methods as an option in the sophomore menu.	The course coordinator (Dr. Tim Knight) has suggested that the course's generic approach to research methods, critical thinking, problem-solving and data interpretation may not be the most effective way to learn these skills. Furthermore, many disciplines require research-oriented courses in the major, creating unnecessary overlap for some students who take this course. The course has not been taught since the spring 2003 semester, and since then there has not been a strong demand for it from students. With other options available in the sophomore menu, this course can be eliminated without creating a problem for students. Finally, eliminating the course resolves potential problems for staffing it.

The following proposals from Dr. Jeff Sykes, coordinator for CORE 1033 *Applied Mathematics*, have been endorsed by the Interdisciplinary Studies Committee.

**New Catalog Listing** 

1033. Mathematics for the Liberal Arts.

Students will engage in a study of mathematical ideas and thinking, learning to solve problems and make decisions using sound quantitative reasoning. Students are strongly encouraged to complete the Mathematics requirement within their first four college semesters. Prerequisite: Official placement or a grade of C or better in ASKL 1013.

Change course title to *Mathematics for the Liberal Arts*.

The current title of CORE 1033, Applied Mathematics, is generally used by the mathematics community to denote an upper-level course that applies calculus and other mathematical techniques to the modeling of real-world situations. The title Mathematics for the Liberal Arts is a commonly used title for courses such as CORE 1033.

Restructure the course to emphasize quantitative reasoning over particular topics.

- 1. The course would begin with a common unit exploring the process by which an educated person attempts to solve a problem of a mathematical nature. For this unit, we would likely adapt the presentation from George Polya's classic, *How to Solve It!*
- 2. After the completion of the initial unit on problem solving, instructors would be free to choose the topics for the remainder of the course. When preregistration materials are distributed to students, the department would provide "promotional material" describing the topics that would be covered in each individual section of the course for the coming semester. Some care would be taken to minimize the amount of overlap between the various sections.
- 3. The course content will include three or four units covering some of the greatest and most interesting ideas in mathematics, chosen from areas such as geometry, probability, statistics, combinatorics, number theory,

A large number of students in CORE 1033 have little or no interest in mathematics, and they see the course simply as an obstacle to graduation. Thus, it is very common to have students that do not put enough effort into the course to truly learn how to reason mathematically. True success in the course comes when a student can be motivated to engage in the content being presented, but "students" are not a monolithic group – they are not all going to be interested in the same topics. Additionally, it is much easier for us as faculty to draw students into a topic for which we have a particular interest – students will appreciate seeing our enthusiasm for a topic that is near and dear to us, and they know when we are not as interested in what we are teaching. As with students, "faculty" are not a monolithic group, and should not be expected to all have the same interests.

- cryptography, infinity, chaos, decision theory, voting systems, apportionment, logic, and game theory.
- 4. Instructors will have the freedom to evaluate students within their sections, but there will be a common instrument used for the assessment of the course as regards its role in the CORE curriculum. This would focus on mathematical reasoning and the problem solving process outlined at the beginning of the course and reinforced throughout the rest of the semester. It could take the form of an examination or an extended project in either case, the assessment instrument would be developed in such a way that it would be independent of the particular topics covered by individual instructors.

## **Patterson School of Natural Sciences**

Department	<b>Proposed Changes</b>	Rationale
Athletic Training	Delete ATEP 3061 Allied Health Internship I and ATEP 3071 Allied Health Internship II.	ATEP 3061 and ATEP 3071 do not meet the objectives of the accreditation body (CAATE: Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education Programs) in regard to interacting and observing other allied health care providers. These courses are no longer relevant and need to be deleted. Deleting these courses would also require that they be removed from the list of requirements from the preprofessional program needed to gain entry into the ATEP program as well as from each of the currently listed ATEP BA degrees.
Athletic Training	Add ATEP 3XX1 Pharmacology for Athletic Trainers and ATEP 3XX1 Psychosocial Issues in Athletic Training.  Course Descriptions  ATEP 3XX1 Pharmacology for Athletic Trainers. This course allows the student the opportunity to identify conditions, recognize signs and symptoms indicating the use of, and advising a patient on the therapeutic medications used in treating certain symptoms, conditions, and physical characteristics association with illness and injury. Prerequisite: formal admission into the ATEP or permission from the instructor. Fall.  ATEP 3XX1 Psychosocial Issues in Athletic Training	These courses have combined cognitive and psychomotor competencies that are taught in other courses. These have been identified as weak areas of study by students taking the national certification examination. By incorporating these courses into the curriculum, we are placing more emphasis on these respective areas. No additional hours are required. These courses will need to be added to the requirements for both B.A. listings, but not the pre-professional requirements.

They are both aware of the change and will take the course in their senior year instead.  Effect on Other Departments Differential Equations was last offered in Spring 2005 as a spring of odd-numbered years course. The semester was changed as part of the mathematics department's curriculum revisions two years ago. When the course came up for Fall 2006, it became clear that the enrollment would be extremely low – the course is required only for Physics majors and the vast majority of them had taken the course in Spring 2005. We discussed this with physics, and the only students that would be enrolling were very early in the physics program and would not have any problem with putting the course off for one year. So the course was pulled from this semester's schedule and tentatively scheduled for Fall 2007 in hopes that the proposed

		semester swap would be approved.  Since this proposal pushes up the scheduled offering of the course, it will not have any effect on any student other than those already accounted for.

# **General Academic Programs**

ESL	Grant students 6 hours of English as a Second Language elective credit toward their graduation requirements after they (1) complete one semester at the Advanced level of the ESL program, and (2) pass CORE 1043 Composition I and CORE 1053 Composition II.	ESL students are full-paying students. Historically, they have only received a GPA and have had their foreign language requirement waived. Those with credible skills emerge from the program able to read and write English at an academic level as well as converse in the language at a competent level. OBU willingly offers up to 6 hours of foreign language credit to students who study locally or for short periods in other countries. Yet, after living immersed in the culture for a period of one to three semesters and after studying a minimum of 20 hours a week, our ESL students currently only get a foreign language waiver.  The ESL Program shall offer 3 levels of instruction - Beginning, Intermediate and Advanced levels. Each level shall include 20 hours of classroom instruction and interaction per week in the following subjects: Reading, Writing, Conversation, Grammar, Pronunciation, Language Lab and American Culture and/or American History. All students must pass the semester's classes with a B average in order to progress to the next level. Assessment for ESL will be made not only on grades, but will also be based on participation in the class, attendance, and diligence.
