| | Rationale Analytics has become a dominant influence on all areas of business. Our current curriculum does not adequately prepare students with the knowledge and skills that they need in this area. Adding the new course, ACCT 2033 Data Analytics for Accounting and Finance, as a requirement for the Accounting and Finance majors will help fill this gap. The addition of this course to the Accounting major will increase the total number of hours to 124. The changes from BUAD 3123 to ACCT 2033 in the Finance major will keep the total hours at 121, and is supported by changes in planned content changes in BUAD 1033, which include increased coverage of spreadsheets. We can accommodate the change by offering fewer sections of Personal Finance and/or Microcomputer Applications. |

This course provides students with an overview of the data analytics process in accounting and finance. Students learn to ask appropriate questions, find and master appropriate data to address those questions, perform test analysis and communicate the results of the data through visualization. Basic knowledge of EXCEL is recommended. Prerequisite: ACCT 2013. **Fall.**

Basic principles of cost accounting with emphasis on the use of accounting information, planning and control. Rationale

Over the 4 years of this program's existence, Community and Family Services' enrollment has grown to 31. The August 2021 hire of Christa Neal as program advisor increased course capacity without any additional expense. Numerous students have transitioned to the CFS program during this school year and we expect that trend to continue.

Surveys in August 2021 of current students and alum from CFS program yielded the following areas of need:

- 2. CFS specific courses
- 3. Variety in faculty
- 4. CFS specific advising
- 5. Guided internship process

 - a. The changes in this proposal intend to serve the students better by providing more focus to the major to prepare them vocationally. The previous version of the major offered too much flexibility such that students with the same major could have widely divergent classroom experiences.
 - b. We anticipate that these new courses will increase enrollment.

| | An annual ministry survey to students administered in the fall semester by Campus Ministries consistently indicates a high number of students who express interest in some kind of "Church Projected Vocation" (For example, the fall '21 survey received responses from 795 students, and 316 students indicated specific interest in various church related vocations (56 indicating church music).). The number of Christian Studies majors are fewer than the number of students interested in ministry. This disparity could be addressed through a major that was more accessible to students pursuing majors other than Christian Studies. |
| | In addition, anecdotally, faculty have had numerous conversations with students who feel called to ministry but who themselves or whose parents and/or pastors have encouraged them to pursue an undergraduate degree that provides more long-term vocational assurance than a Christian Studies degree and to pursue theological education in graduate school or seminary. Rationale

The changes to the descriptions will update the catalog to current course content. The changes to the prerequisites of these courses will help clarify what students need to successfully complete each course. (ART) 1043. Digital Tools and Concepts.

This course serves as an introduction to the basic digital toolkit for the contemporary designer and digital artist. It will introduce the various programs of the Adobe Creative Suite and develop visual problem solving and conceptualization skills. Prerequisites: ART 1003 and 1013. **Fall, Spring.**

(ART) 2243. Typography.

This course will focus on the study of the letterform as it relates to visual communication. Projects will explore letterform construction and classification, measuring systems, issues of legibility and practical issues of setting and using type effectively. Prerequisites: ART 1003, 1013, 1043 and 2323. **Spring.**

(ART) 2323. Graphic Design I.

This course serves as an introduction to the field of graphic design. Students will explore the principles of design, the development of icons and symbols, and the interaction of type and image to create visual communication projects. Prerequisites: ART 1003, 1013 and 1043. **Fall, Spring.**

(ART) 3033. Graphic Design II.

This course presents further study in the field of graphic design. Students will develop the principles of composition in visual communication. They will also create brand identity systems and develop professional presentation skills. Prerequisites: ART 1003, 1013, 1043 and 2323. **Fall**.

(ART) 3423. Issues in Graphic Design.

This course will explore notable and contemporary graphic design issues and theories Emphasis will be placed on communication theory, modes of persuasion, social responsibility, sustainability, and audience-centric design. Prerequisites: ART 1003, 1013, 1043, 2323 and 3033. **Spring of odd-numbered years.**

(ART) 3803. Internship.

The student will produce design work for a company in an intern capacity. Placement will be initiated by the student and must be approved as appropriate experience by the Art faculty. A minimum of 160 work hours is required. Prerequisites: ART 2323, 3033 and permission of instructor. **Fall, Spring, Summer.**

(ART) 4022. Graphic Design Portfolio.

Preparation of design projects and self-promotion pieces suitable for presentation to prospective employers. Course will also give practical instruction for the student entering the profession. Prerequisite: ART 1003, 1013, 1043, 2323 and 3033. **Fall**.

(ART) 4343. User Experience and Interface Design.

Rationale

There needs to be a distinction in course titles between the initial course that is required by all music degrees and the additional two courses that are required for the Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Music Education, and Bachelor of Arts in Music degrees. The course sequence of History of Western Music 1, 2, 3 leads one to think that all three courses are required. This is not the case.

The initial course that is required by all music majors, Survey of Music History, covers music from all parts of the world, not just Western Music. The catalog course description for Survey of Music History needs to be changed to reflect the content of the materials covered in the course. Additionally, the description change for this course will better reflect its content and to help meet the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM) standards and meet accreditation requirements for the Bachelor Arts in Music (Worship Studies) degree.

Psychology & Christian Studies

Proposed Changes

- PSYC 2003 Human Development will replace the required EDFN 2053 Child and Adolescent Development.
- PSYC 2063 Research Methods 1 will be required, which will reduce the number of hours from the clinical track options from 12 to 9 hours.

Rationale

Many students come to Ouachita interested in studying counseling at a faith-based university. Currently, there is not a clear plan of study at Ouachita for students that want to become counselors. Some students pursue this path as a psychology major, and others pursue this path as a community and family services major. While either path can get you into a counseling master's program, we believe that there are necessary components of each program that all pre-counseling students should get. Specifically, psychology provides that strong research and statistics skills needed to utilize empirically based practices as a counselor, and community and family services includes the more direct counseling courses taught by licensed professional counselors.

To eliminate confusion for current and prospective students about what they should study if they want to become a counselor, we request that this double major plan be included in the catalog. This will allow us to show students the specific program of study for this desired profession. It will also show our commitment to a Christ-centered learning environment and will allow the benefit of learning about counseling from two different academic schools. As such, we believe this will be an added recruitment tool. Further, if Ouachita moves forward with a master's in counseling, we believe that this program of study will help us recruit more students.

Pre-Counseling Program of Study B.A. in Psychology and Community and Family Services

Students that desire to pursue a graduate degree in counseling are encouraged to double major in Psychology and Community and Family Services-Clinical Emphasis. This program of study requires the completion of the following requirements:

Psychology: A minimum of 39 hours of department approved (PSYC) courses including PSYC 1013, 2033, 2054, 2063, 3053, 4003 plus three from among PSYC 3013, 3064, 3093, and 4033 (all four strongly recommended), plus at least one from among PSYC 3073, 4303, and 4313. A 2.000 GPA in these courses is required for graduation.

Community and Family Services: Students must complete the basic CAFS requirements, four courses from the Clinical Emphasis, and 2 courses from the Interdisciplinary menu.

Basic Requirements: CHST 1001, BSTH 1003, SOCI 1003, PSYC 2033, COMM 1003, CAFS 3003, COMM 3033, CHMN 3103, CAFS 3433, PHIL 4013, and BSTH 4403

<u>Clinical Emphasis</u>: Choose three courses from CAFS 3XX3 (Evidence-based Trauma Therapy Models), CAFS 3XX3 (Court and Community Serving Systems), CHMN 3353, CHMN 3363, PHIL 3193, PSYC 4013, and SOCI 2023
